

Preface

The purpose of this guide is to provide practical information for the use of Parliamentary Records in monarchical Egypt (*Madabit majlis al-Nuwwab and Madabit Majlis al-Shuyukh*, 1924-1952) at the Institute of Oriental Culture, the University of Tokyo. These records are regarded as a historical source of the highest value in the studies of interwar Egypt, parliamentary politics, the policy-making process, and contemporary socio-economic issues in particular.

This guide is published as a research product of the Contemporary Islamic Studies Project at the Toyo Bunko, whose aim is to conduct comparative studies of the parliamentary systems in the Middle East by using parliamentary records and other basic documents.
